
A ISSIGNARY JORK

When dinner was over, we all gathered in the girls' playroom, to extend a special valgors to our distinguish-



that the first Indian School for the district of Saddle Lake was erected in 1892 at Lac Labiche by Rev. Father Henry Grandin and the administration was given to the kev. Grey Nuns of Montreal? .. Yes. in 1898, by order of the Indian Department, the pupils of the school were sent to Saddle Lake where a new school had been built which was called Blue Quills for the first time. Finally, on December 7th, 1931, the pupils of Saddle Lake numbering 55 were transfered to St. Paul, where one of the finest schools for Indians had been erected by the Canadian Government; it is the actual Blue Quills Residential School. The Rev. Grey Nuns had the administration of the school from the beginning till 1929 when they asked the Rev. Chlate fathers to assume it for the years to come.

In the year 1938-39 he studies the Cree Language at Delmas, Pask. Then he takes charge of the Beaver Lake Reserve, GrandBay, and Elenore settlement while he is stationed at Lac la Biche.

In 1940 he is called by the French Government to join the army, so he leaves Lac la Biche and goes to Halifax, but he cannot cross the ocean; therefore is exempted from military service and returns to his missionary work.

In 1941 he is sent to Green Lake where he takes charge of the Half-Breed colony; under his administration a new church and a rectory are built in the new colony.

In 1947, he is named Principal of Blue Quills Residential School, and since this date devotes himsself to the education of the Indian children seeking always to improve their welfare. He encourages them to go through High School as as is ascertained at the present time by those attending grade IX. X and XI at St. Paul. He has at heart the temporal and spiritual welfare of all the pupils committed to his care, as everyone attending the education week can testify. Under his administration, the wing connected to the main building started in 1941, has been completed. giving plenty of room for classes, shops and a gymnasium and thus being able to accommodate more pupils in the future.

Staff, pupils and Parents too are proud of their School ... and proud of their Principal.
