With reference to your voucher, No. 6, amounting to \$220.00 in favor of Messrs. Wilson Bros. for a wind stacker, I beg to advise you that before making payment the Department would like you to obtain from Messrs. Wilson Bros. a guarantee that the engine supplied will run the separator to its full capacity in combination with the wind stacker.

It is generally credited that these engines do not develop their rated horse power except when running at full speed and this can only be obtained under the most favorable circumstances as regards the atmosphere, pure gasoline, and dry grain. It is understood that a wind stacker requires from four to six horse power to develop its full capacity, according to the size of the machine; and it is thought that most of the threshing outfits with wind stackers, or blowers, have engines of from 18 to 30 H.P.

It would be a useless expense to buy a windstacker if your engine has not power to run it, consequently it will be well to interview parties who have had practical experience, before making any further outlay in that line.



It is generally credited that these engines do not develop their rated horse power except when running at full speed and this can only be obtained under the most favorable conditions. It is understood that a wind stacker requires from four to six horse power to develop its full capacity, according to the size of the machine; and it is thought that most of the threshing outfits with wind stackers, or blowers, have engines of from 12 to 30 H.P.







I was directed to inspect a Hot Air Engine that is now lying at Mr. Wm. Heads at Calgary and report as to whether it is of any value and whether it can be repaired and made fit for use. I learn that it was discarded from your institution and I shall thank you to inform me as to why you discarded it. I understand you tried to use it in a well about 80' deep and I presume it was expected to force water about 40' above the Engine. From what you know of it do you not think it is repairable and if given about $\frac{1}{2}$ the work that it will yet give satisfaction, say in a well 40' and and force water not over 40' above it. The pump is not with the Engine, what disposition was made of the pump?

This outfit, I judge, cost 3 or \$400.00 and if it can yet be repaired, at a reasonable cost, and made useful it seems a pity to sell it for old iron.
