HIS EXCELLENCY BISHOP PHILIPPE LUSSIER






He was in the procession of 2,600 bishops who marched into St. Peter's Basilica for the opening. He attended 36 general meetings of the council.

We will continue praying for our Bishop and for all the members of the Ecumenical Council, asking God to bless the decisions which will be formulated when they meet again in Rome.








OUR NEW PRINCIPAL

We hope Father Principal will enjoy a long and happy stay among us.






FAREWELL AND GOD BLESS YOU



May God bless him a hundredfold for all the good he has done during his stay at Blue Quills.







The curtains opened to display the Cadet Band, with Father Principal himself as director. It certainly was the best in all the "local land."


Then twelve peppy little grey mice popped out of nowhere and decided on the spot to bell the old cat. But who would do it? That was the problem.

RED CROSS NIGHT AT BLUE QUILLS
















May is the month of spring tearty. It is the season of colorful flowers and singing birds, of green budding leaves and murmuring brooks. It is the spring chorus of life and happiness.
