HIS EXCELLENCY BISHOP PHILIPPE LUSSIER

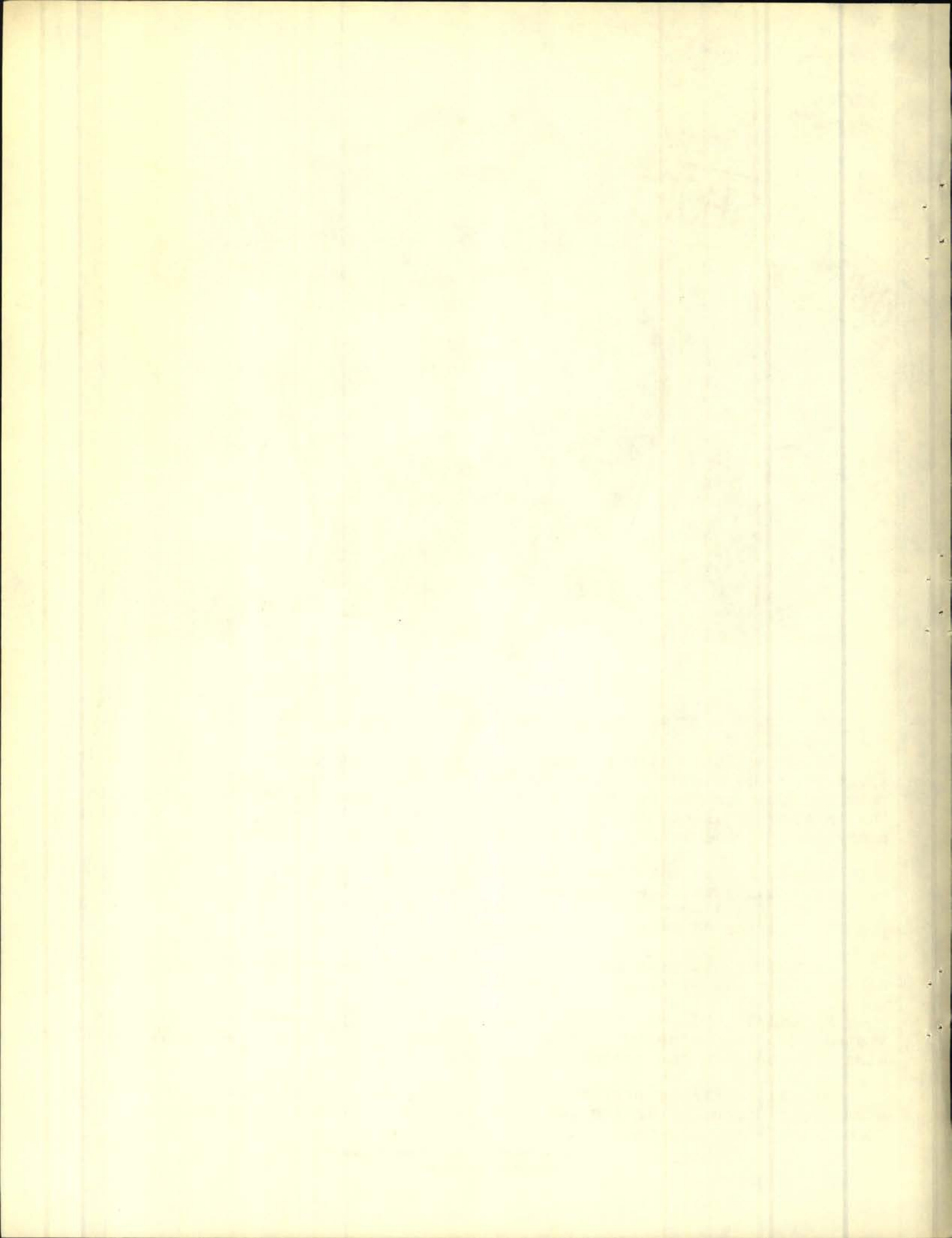
His Excellency Bishop Lussier, bishop of the St. Paul Diocese, having spent over two months in Rome for the Ecumenical Council last winter, returned home in mid-December. His Excellency said he was impressed with the international atmosphere brought to the Council by delegates from almost every part of the world, who reflected the customs of their country.


Commenting on the tremendous variety of activities together with a wonderful unity which were among the greatest features of the Council in Rome, His Excellency pointed out that there was certainly no unemployment problem for the 65 Canadian bishops who attended.

He was in the procession of 2,600 bishops who marched into St. Peter's Basilica for the opening. He attended 36 general meetings of the council.

He added: "It was always with awe and a deep emotion that we penetrated into the majestic temple of the Piazza San Pietro, where the meetings always began with the celebration of the Mass."

We will continue praying for our Bishop and for all the members of the Ecumenical Council, asking God to bless the decisions which will be formulated when they meet again in Rome.

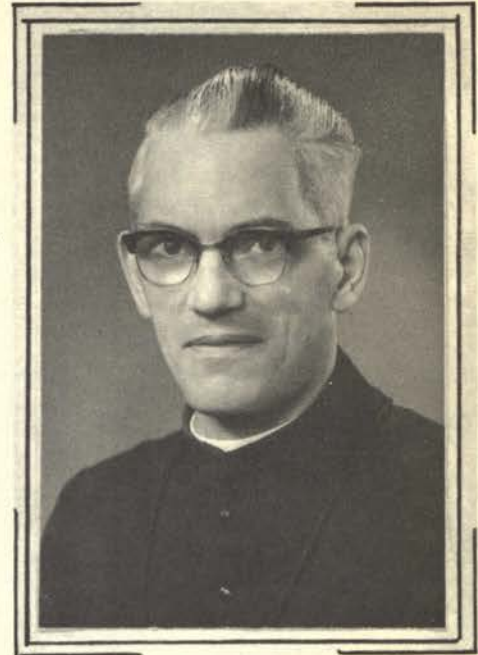

FAREWELL AND GOD BLESS YOU

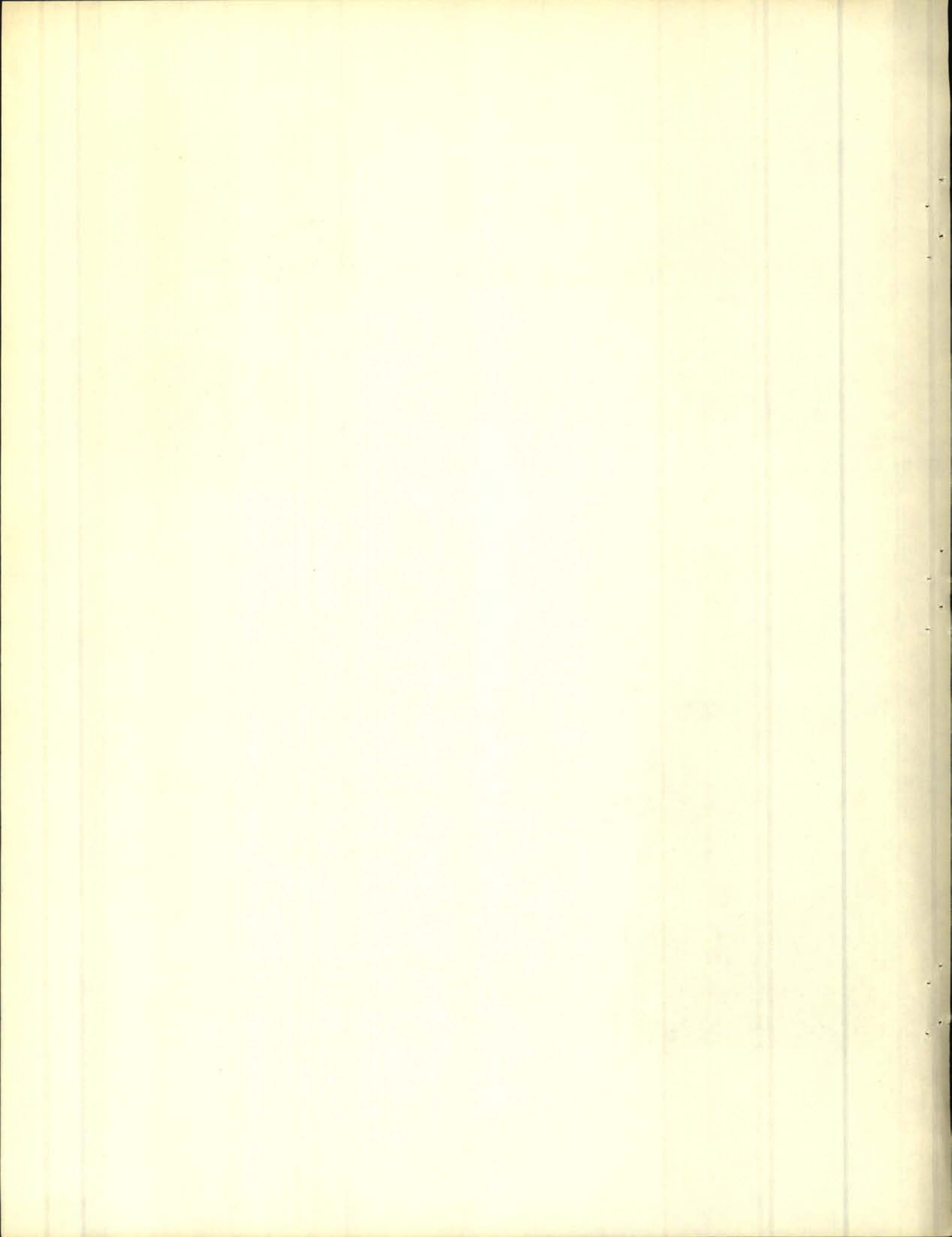

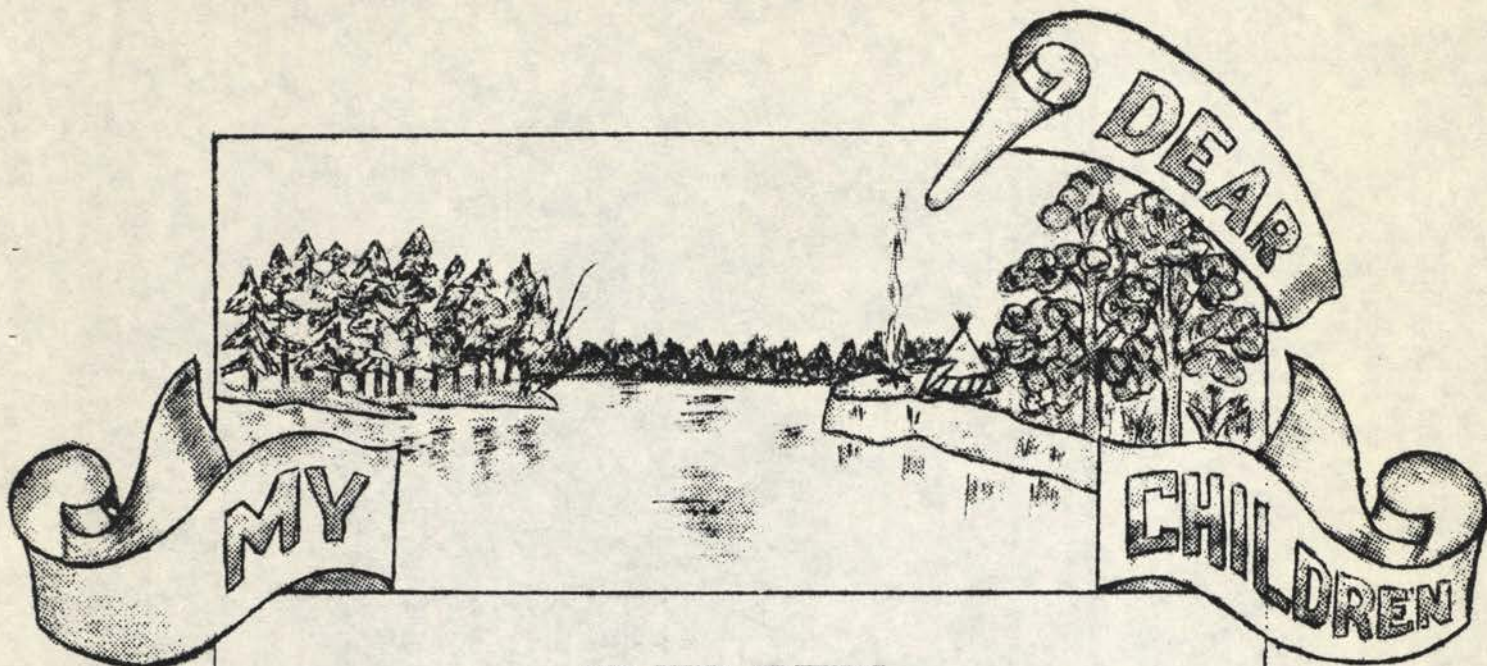

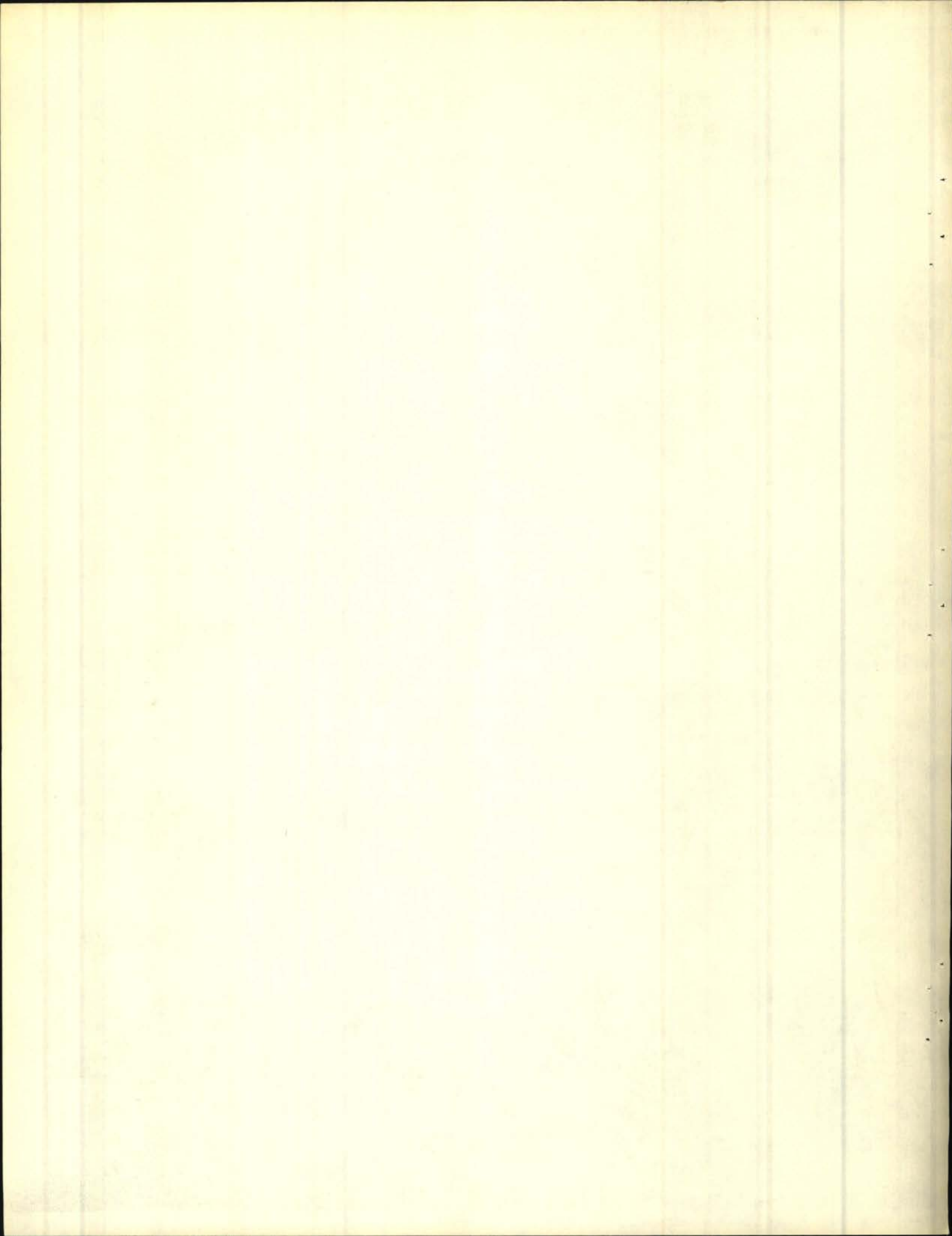

Our first duty was to plan our study periods. Here we must try to solve our problems and this demands the co-operation of all the student body.

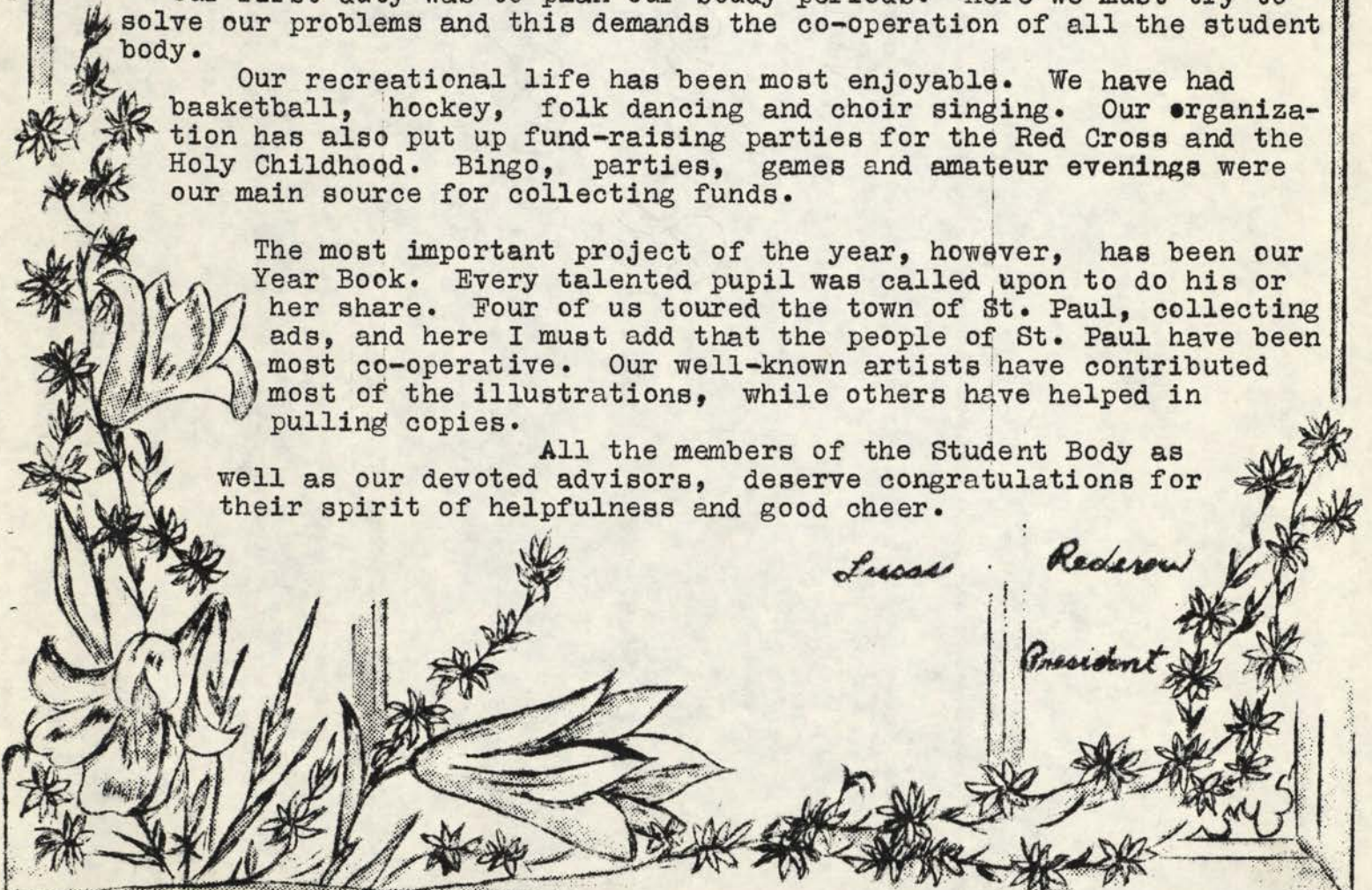

Dear Students,



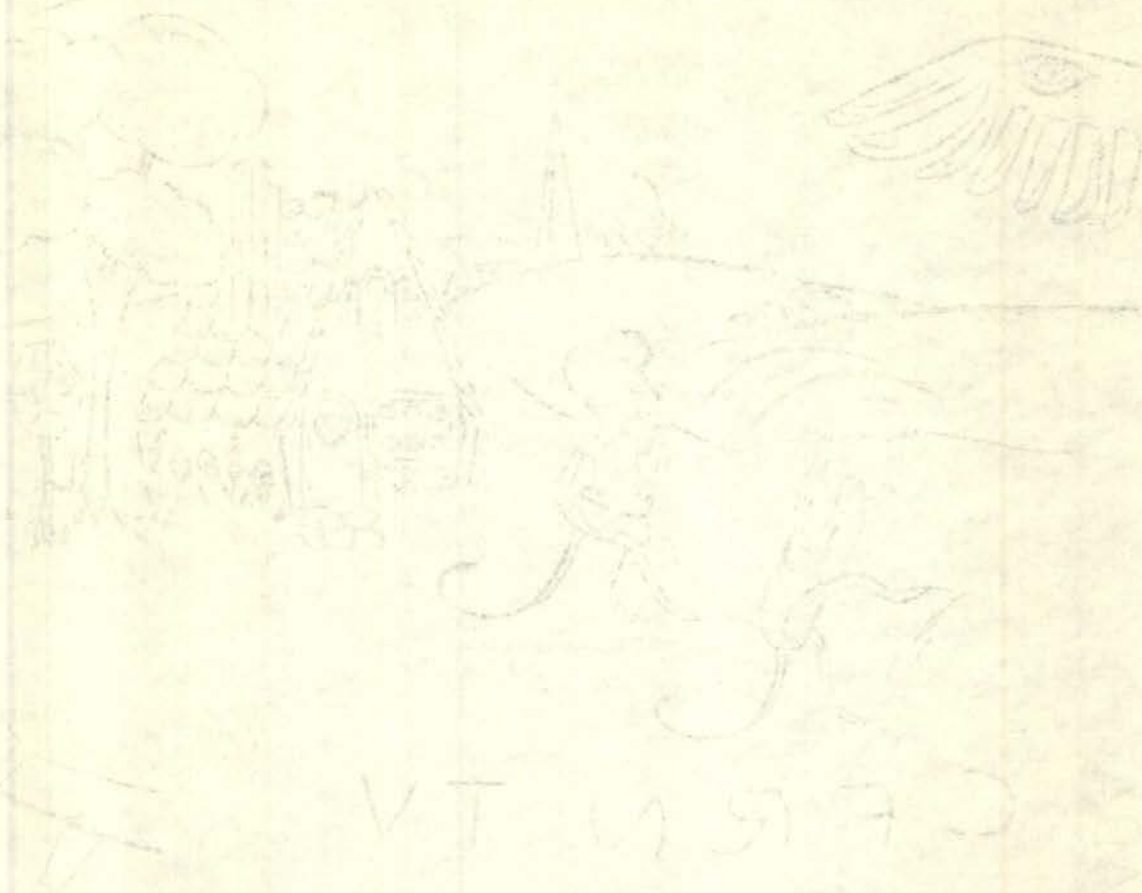
# KIDDIES ON CAMERA
