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



It took me some time to obtain from our Principals their reactions to the report and during the last two weeks I have been away from my residence. # 1) Sturgeon Lake Residential School to your I contension that the entire and the entire and the entire of the enti

As regards the accepting of Indian pupils from the Sturgeon Lake Reserve, the Valleyview Separate School will be able to take in only those of Grades VIII and IX for this year who number in these grades 13 pupils at most. Owing to considerable delay in getting the assurance of grants and authorization to sell the debentures for the construction of this new Separate School, it was not possible to have the go ahead from the Department until a month ago, and tenders for the school building were not opened until July 28th and thus the building is only on the point of starting. It will probably not be completed much before Christmas and as we shall have to be making use of temporary classrooms we shall have to limit the number of pupils . as much as possible.

I am pleased that the Department proposes to construct a three classroom school on the site of the present Residential School and that it will compensate for a proportionate share of the cost to the Residential School of sewage and water system which the Provincial Department of Health required we construct. #### 2) Fort Vermilion Residential School

I would very much regret if the Fort Vermilion Residential School were ever definitely closed and the children from the Fort Vermilion area who could not attend the Day School be sent in residence to the Desmarais Residential School. Apart from the Beaver Indians whose children are served by the Boyer Day School, the Indians of all the other Reserves are nomads and will depend for an indefinite future on trapping as a means of livelihood. This hardly allows them to provide the required stability for success in the studies of their children in Day Schools and barely suffices for their subsistence, with the result that the children can hardly be clothed and are undernourished. This means that the Department rather than allow the youngsters to grow up fed and decently educated maintains them in their inferior status if they are to be educated only or mostly in Day Schools. Some of your field men have stated definitely that relief will be

given them, but you know that relief only degrades those to whom it is served and takes away the pride of self-support and makes of them individuals who have no wish to work or go out trapping and thus they become morally degraded. These conditions already apply to some of the northern Reserves in my territory where relief is being given out in order that the families may reside in the neighbourhood of a Day School and where the Indian population is becoming good for nothing.

This policy of opening further Day Schools in the Fort Vermilion area likewise militates against the slow and gradual integration of these Indians who will live far from all white settlements, while integration could be carried out far more effectively in the Residential School at Fort Vermilion where the Indian children come in constant contact with the White and Metis children of the Separate School. It appears to us that the Department in the policies it furthers in this area are precisely contrary to the general policies to which it has so firmly held in other parts of the country. In the Day Schools at Meander River, Fox Lake and more so at Fifth Meridian, if a Day School is opened there, it can be expected that only very few pupils, if any, will ever reach high school. There is no incentive for higher studies in these remote areas if no contact is had with the outside world and very little chance that the pupils will ever speak anything but their native ? language in ordinary conversation. I am sure you are aware that the proportion of pupils sttaining high school status in the Day Schools, at least in Alberta, is very much less than that of those attending the Residential Schools. The more or less indiscriminate policy of Day Schools will probably produce far more morons than it will help the cause of education in the still primitive conditions of the Indians in Northern Alberta.

I hope that you will receive the recommendations made to the Department by the Indian Delegation at the last Convention of the Catholic Indian League. It was the contention of the Indians attending that education in the Residential Schools is superior to that which can be given in the Day Schools and that the former prepare the pupils better for high school.

Here is the copy of the Resolution passed at the Convention in Hobbema:

Whereas it is the general policy of the Indian Department to substitute Day Schools wherever at all feasible for the existing Residential Schools and to maintain only a few Residential Schools to be used exclusively for orphans, for children of broken homes, or for those living in areas where no Day School is possible,

Whereas the living and economical conditions and housing of many Indian families are such that the children cannot adequately benefit educationally from their schooling in Day Schools, and will rarely reach high school status, and

Whereas many Indian parents live by trapping or hunting, er must work off the Reserves and cannot keep their children at home, if they must provide a living for the family, and

Whereas it is socially wrong to give relief to Indian families only to keep them on the Reserve that they may send their children to a Day School, and thus make of the adults a shiftless race of Indians as has been done frequently by the Indian Department, and

Whereas many cases have been brought to the attention of the Catholic Indian League of Officials of the Indian Department offering bribes to the Indians that the latter may place their children in Day Schools and not in Residential Schools;

Be it resolved that the Indian Department maintain the present Residential Schools wherever they exist and build others where needed, and thus better serve the cause of Indian Education.

I think that an impartial survey would confirm this declaration of the Indians. The delegates from Brocket and elsewhere very definitely denot wish to see their Residential School disappear. I believe that where the Indian parents wish their children to attend as day pupils, their wish should be granted as far as possible, but on the other hand, where they strongly object to day assistance, they should be given the privilege of sending them to a Residential School which in their estimation will better provide for a more progressive education.

Applying this principle to the Fort Vermilion area, I sincerely believe that no thought should be given of sending the children from the Fort Vermilion area to Desmarais, and maintain the present Residential School as such, integrating the Indian children with those of the Separate School. Moreever, just as White parents do not as a rule care to see their children sent to school a long distance from their home and with little or no possibility of seeing them during the whole school year, so do these Indian people in the area of Fort Vermilion strongly object to having their children sent to Desmarais, as communications overland are non-existent and it cannot be expected that the Indian parents will charter a plane to see them to Desmarais. I feel that humanitarian sentiments would make this easily understandable. I fear it may well happen that those in administration easily lose sight of the feelings of parents in deciding to tear children from their home environment against the wishes of the parents to place them a considerable distance away. It may be opportune to take note of the golden rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you".

In a conversation with me, Mr. Davey mentioned the fact that Desmarais Residential School, a very splendid monument indeed, built for 150 resident pupils, has had this last year only slightly more than 100 boarders and that it should accommodate the pupils from other areas so as not to become a white elephant. Evidently when I pressed that it be built and final approval for the construction was granted, it was with the definite conviction that it could be filled with pupils from Wabasca and the surrounding country. There are undoubtedly sufficient pupils to fill it from there if these pupils attend as boarders, but during these last two years such pressure has been imposed upon the parents that they keep their children at home and have them attend as day scholars, that the Department is emptying through this pressure the Residential School. This policy is being pushed ahead from Ottawa in a degree that no one could foresee three or four years ago.

When a few years ago we were invited to turn over to the Department the possession of our three Residential Schools at Joussard, Desmarais and Fort Vermillon with no financial compensation, we did so with a definite expectation that these Residential Schools would continue to exist as such, and

while we could not reasonably object to the establishment of Day Schools, or the attendance at Residential Schools of day pupils, we did not expect nor could we imagine that a strong and unjustifiable pressure would be made upon Indian parents so that these Residential Schools could be closed down definitely. I feel that this attitude of certain officials of the Department has not been fair to us and to many Indian parents and that this policy of pressure should be discontinued, giving reasonable freedom to the Indians to send their children to a Residential School if they prefer it to the Day School, the latter not being able to give their children the same educational opportunities. A few months ago, the teachers of all Home Economics for girla and Trades fer boys were notified that these courses will be discontinued in the Residential and Day Schools for all pupils under Grade VII. I am convinced that this decision is radically wrong and that it should be reversed immediately. We have striven for years to raise the standard of the Indians and have been generously helped for three-quarters of a century by the Indian Department. Most of the officials in the Indian Affairs Branch have received their training among the Whites only and very few have lived among Indians to realize that the degree of maturity of the latter is not that of the Whites. Improvement has been extremely slow over a very long period of time. While more progress is being achieved presently where the Indians are in closer contact with the Whites, progress is still slow in most of our Northern area. No one considering objectively the evidence, can expect that a high percentage of the present pupils will attain the higher degrees of academic studies. On the other hand, they must be provided with means of assuring their livelihood and establishing decent homes. The majority of Indian pupils whether in Day or Residential Schools in our area will hardly reach Grade VII and only a minor proportion go beyond? This decision of the Department to discontinue the manual courses will be seriously detrimental to the future of these boys and girls and I do hope that the decision will be reversed. If it is not, I intend to give orders to our teaching personnel to go ahead with the courses nevertheless, as I find these courses indispensable for the future of these poor children. The decision was taken without any consultation with our Principals or with myself and it only further establishes proof that those who have taken it do not realize the needs of our Indian population and assimilate their conditions to those of the White people. I know that in Alberta these subjects are not taught before Grade VII in the Provincial schools where most pupils reach at least Grades VIII or IX, but that is not the case with the Indians. I have been given to understand that at the Fort Vermilion Residential School the Department does not intend to carry out fully the agreement proposed between itself and ourselves to provide a clear and hygienic water supply and to assure satisfactory sewage disposal. Again, I hope that this decision will be reversed, this should not justify installing a defective water supply or prevent proper sewage disposal. These conveniences are indispensable for both Residential and Day Schools. Assumption Indian Residential School 3) I am pleased to note that a two classroom school of an expandable nature will be built at Assumption and that the road from Habay to Assumption will be improved to assure the transportation of selected children to attend on a day basis. It must be noted that not only will it be necessary to have a good road between Habay and Assumption but also a bridge built over the Hay

River so that those pupils who come from Habay and are on the north side of the river may cross the river at all times of the year. Otherwise, these pupils would be unable to attend the school for several weeks when the river freezes in the fall or thaws in the spring. The bus which will be provided should be in excellent condition so that it may not break down unexpectedly, there being no facilities for repairs in the area. Also owing to the severe cold in winter, a heated garage should be available at the school for this bus during the cold season.

As to the choice of pupils who will attend on a day basis, I trust that orders will be given to consult the School Principal at Assumption as he generally knows a good deal more about the family conditions than would the School Inspector or even possibly the local Departmental Superintendent.

I consider it practically indispensable that an auditorium be built at the school with facilities for home economics and manual training. The recreation rooms in the Residential School are unfortunately much too small and their capacity will be further taxed with the constantly growing number of pupils each year. The Principal of Assumption School and myself believe that there should be no delay in building this auditorium and facilities for home economics and manual training.

A residence for the teaching personnel was built last year at the Residential School for a family and for two unmarried teachers. Unfortunately, the disposal of the apartments allows little privacy to the family and this may in time cause serious difficulties, although until now it does not appear that any have arisen. A residence should be built without delay for the lay employees at the school, as the old log shacks presently being used for the male employees are definitely unsuitable and the female employees have to sleep in the girls' dormitory. While these Indian women or Indian girls have accepted their conditions, it is not what should be.

#### 4) Desmarais Residential School

I have already touched on the matter of Resident and Day pupils. I believe that no pressure should be brought on the parents to force them to send their children as day pupils if they prefer sending them as residents, and that it would be seriously prejudicial to the morality and self-pride of the Indians if they were to be given relief only to keep the families in the neighbourhood of the school rather than go out to work or trap. It seems to me that definite instructions should be given to the fieldmen that pressure be not exercised by them to force day attendance by promising relief to those who do so, thus destroying the moral fiber of the Indian people. If this policy were adopted there would not be any need of bringing pupils here from outside as the Indian population is rapidly expanding wherever there are Indians.

#### 5) Joussard Indian Residential School

It had been our hope and it was our recommendation some two or three years ago before a building was put up for manual training that a block be set up for a dormitory and recreation room for the older boys and for home economics and manual training classes. The Department decided to build only the manual training class. While a two classroom block of expandable nature will relieve the situation for the academic classes, it still does not provide for the other needs.

Mr. Davey will rember that several years ago whethere was question of setting up Day Schools on both the Driftpile and Sucker Creek Reserves, I saw no difficulty in opening the Day School on the Driftpile Reserve because there the Indians had been pleading for one, but I did object to opening a Day School on the Sucker Creek Reserve because the Indians were opposed to such an establishment. The Sucker Creek Indians are still strongly opposed to sending their pupils on a day basis. Their desires should be given consideration. Last year not only because of insufficient space in the Residential School, but especially through the strong pressure brought about by the Agent, did they consent that a limited number of their children should attend on a day basis. No further pressure should be brought upon these people to force them to send their children on a day basis, as such a policy will destroy very much of what has been achieved these latter years. An increasing number of pupils are now in the high school grades and progressing favorably because of the Residential School; grades X and XI are to be taught at the school this year. If the policy of forcing the pupils to attend as day pupils is maintained, there will be a lowering of standards and serious discontent on the part of the Indians. It is clear that in no homes are there any facilities for studies and in very few homes will there be sufficient home discipline to prevent the students from being constantly distracted by other activities nor will they have sufficient sleep to be able to study when they come back to school. The policy which has been set down for the agent to whom orders have been given to have an additional 25 pupils on a day basis from Sucker Creek this coming September, is a backward step for the school. I hope it will be countermanded.

#### 6) Boyer River Day School

The missionary in charge of the Beaver Indians whose children attend the Boyer River Indian Day School was away at the time that Mr. Deziel visited Fort Vermilion, and I could not very well attest as to what this situation really is. I am quite positive that here again pressure has been brought upon the Indians by Mr. Jampolsky and some of the teachers at the Rocky Lane Public School as well as by the Provincial Inspector of Schools to draw away Indians from their Day School and have them attend the Rocky Lane Public School. I shall have to wait until Father Litzler, the missionary in charge, returns to Fort Vermilion to size up the situation.

7) As for Kinuso, I have no further remarks for the time being.

I hope this lengthy commentary will not put your patience too much to task. I feel very strongly on many of the points I have brought to your attention, and while I am convinces of your deep sincerity and interest in the welfare of the Indian people, I would appreciate that a reversal of policy be adopted by the Department which presently is working towards the almost complete disappearance of Residential Schools in our area. This, I am firmly convinced. will be positively detrimental to Indian Education here and elsewhere.

Furthermore, while the Catholic Vicars Apostolic and Oblate Provincials exposed clearly their mind last January as to the gradual evolution in Indian Education, and listened with unbiased interest to what yourselves thought of these same problems, it did seem that there is not very much disagreement between our points of view as to the ultimate aims, but there is a considerable difference in the timing of the evolution and we believe from past experience that to proceed slowly should be the watchword in bringing about this evolution. In my opinion, many of your field men are in too great a hurry to reach the goal and will hurt the cause they hope to serve.


Faculties are granted you to absolve her. You must warn her, however, that if she returns to live with William Shae the censure is re-incurred. You must also give her a suitable penance.

Dear Father Hudon:-

Your letter of September 13th arrived this morning which the Bishop handed over to me.

The dispensation for three banns granted on September 12th, 1960 was for George Albert Little Moustache and Emily David. In your letter of the 13th you ask for a mixed marriage dispensation for George Yellow Horn and Emily David. Which is the correct name?

Since Emily David was baptized a Catholic there cannot be a dispensation for mixed religion. What is required is to be found under canons 1065 and 1066 of your code. In other words, if a grave reason exists for this marriage, then you must have her sign the promises (as found on an application for a dispensation form) that she will raise the children as Catholics and not interfer with the Catholic religion of her spouse. Then you must seek the permission of the Bishop to go ahead with this marriage. If and when both of the requirements are fulfilled, then the Bishop can act, but not before.

Missionary, Peigan Indian Reserve, approached this office October 7, 1959 with request for an instructor to be paid for each of two adult education groups proposed by him for the reserve. These instructors would come from outside reserve area and their coming to Brocket would involve personal expenses. Rev. Fr. Hudon proposes one or two classes per week for each group of afternoom duration. Rev. Fr. Hudon has offered to organize and oversee project. It was suggested by Rev. Fr. Hudon that each instructor be paid \$10.00 for afternoom instruction.

In addition it is requested that materials possibly up to \$100.00 be purchased for each group.

As you are aware there is practically nothing for adults or Indians generally to do on the reserve since the loss of the community hall. Adult education is important to fit Indians for integration and to bring out their capabilities. Rev. Fr. Hudon has offered the basement of church for womans group.

I recommend Rev. Fr. Hudon's efforts to assist Indians in this field be encouraged by financial assistance.

#### Adult Educational Classes:



In a letter dated Feb.22d 1960, your Department had approved that adult educational classes in sowing and cooking be given on the Peigan Reserve.

From Feb, 1960 to the end of May 1960, we had organized a sew-ing club in Brocket. Classes were held twice a week and a lady, Mrs. Anne Petiot was acting as teacher and guide. People who attended the classes realized that it was a great help for them and was giving them a good training.

The teacher was paid by the government (85.00 per class) and part of the material was supplied also. We wish to continue with those classes this year and keep on the good work started last year.

Classes will started on the firt week of Nov. 1960. However we want a new item added to the program which is cooking and room is awailible in the same building for that purpose. In a letter dated march 24th 1960, I had agked that the cook-stove which was stored in a shed in Brocket be brought bask into the R.C. Rectory for the purpose of those classes; - I never had any answer yet.

Could we asked your department to give an immediate answer

to this point and also request from department an average of \$70.00 monthly for material and supply plus the \$5.00 per class for the teacher and supervisor or guide.

Mrs Wellie Wellow Horn had accepted to be in charge of those classes. Mrs Yellow Horn will be help and guide by Sister Superior of Sacred Heart School, who will attend to the classes once a week.

The need of adult educational classes is greater than never on the Peigan Reserve and we hope that your department will give an immediate attention to the adult education.

Hoping that this will be of a great help to many of our Indians and that they will appreciate it.



As the total grant for materials and supplies last year was \$125.00, I feel that the amount requested this year is high, and I would appreciate it if you would discuss this matter with Father Hudon and ask him to submit a more reasonable figure.
- 2) As I do not know Mrs. Nellie Yellow Horn, I do not know what qualifications she holds for conducting such a course. Would you please ask Father Hudon to supply me with this information.
