We acknowledge receipt of your letter of December 15th in connection with electric service costs at the Indian Schools at Cardston, Hobbema and Cluny.

With regard to Cardston, we understand that there is no complaint on the basis of the present billing arrangements.

At Cluny, we have the situation under investigation and have written Father Riou advising him that a demand meter is being installed for the purpose of determining the actual power demand, and we expect to have what information is required within the next two or three weeks.

Our Mr. D. A. Hansen, at 205 McLeod Bldg., Edmonton, would be glad to discuss the Hobbema situation with you as this area comes under his supervision. We made some changes in the billing arrangement for this school last June and Mr. Hansen will be able to discuss this matter with you fully, at your convenience.






Avec son aide, j'ai trouvé certains items sur lesquels je veux attirer votre attention. Certains ne sont pas sur le rapport ci-inclus.

Dear Sir:-

With further reference to our letter to you of December 16th last in connection with the electric service accounts for the Crowfoot Residential School, we wish to advise as follows:

On December 21st a special motor was installed at the school, which registers both the energy consumption (in Kilowatt Hours) and the actual power load or demand in Kilowatts. Do to about January 18th the meter had shown a maximum demand of 8 Milowatts.

You will understand that in our rate schedule the actual installed capacity in kilowatts (or horsepower) is taken as the basis for setting the Service Charge and Cotermining the same of kilowatt hours in each separate rate block for the snergy charge. The school has actually about 20 K.W. in appliances installed, not to mention the lighting installation. At the present time the account is being billed on the basis of 10 K.W. instead of the actual connected load; the rates being the standard Clumy schools which is as follows:


Monthly Service Charge: First 1/2 K.W. of installed capacity - \$1.50

Each additional 1/4 K.W. of installed
capacity - .40

Monthly Energy Charge: (in addition to Service Charge)

Discount: 10% of the even dollars for prompt payment.

On the basis of the 10 K.W. installed capacity rating, your monthly Service Charge amounts to \$15.70 and the energy consumed is charged as follows:



First 500 K.W.H. per month @ 10d per K.W.H.

Next 1500 " " @ 5d " "

All over 2000 " " " @ 21d " "

We are prepared to bill your account in future on the basis of the highest demand established by the demand meter, and to make this basis effective as from January 12th, 1940, which will cover the next current billing. It should be understood that the demand may exceed the present maximum of 8 K.W. in which event the account would thereafter be based on such higher demand, and so from time to time. We believe it is possible for you to exercise considerable control over the maximum demand by diversifying the use of the heavier capacity appliances. For instance, we might suggest that when the laundry equipment is being used, orders might be given that certain other motors or hotplates, etc., be left idle. By making such adjustments in the use of the equipment, you not only keep the Service Charge down but also reduce the proportions of the Energy Blocks so that even though the same total number of Kilowatt Hoars are used as in the past, there will be less charged at the low rate and a larger percentage at the lower follow-on rates. On an 3 K.W. demand, the billing works out as follows:

Service Charge - \$13.50 per month

Energy Charge

First 400 K.W.H. per month @ 10g per N.W.H.

Next 1200

All Over 1600

" " 21g " "

Discount - 10% of even dollars.

The main trouble which adversely affects your service costs is that your demand is out of proportion to the energy consumption. Eany consumers have found that they can very conveniently diversify their work and even use smaller motors, etc., to such an extent that their unit costs are considerably reduced while they still continue to make full use of the service or even increase their energy consumption, if desired.

Dear Sir:

I have yours of January 26th for which I thank you. Although I appreciate your efforts to reduce somewhat both the service charge bringing on annual reduction of \$38.40 and the Energy Charge of 10 ots a kw on 400 kw instead of 500 kw, still I feel that the 10 cts bate should not be extended to more than 200 kw.end then the 5ots rate all the more so that there cen be no question of benefitting of the lower rates for the monthly consumption of over 1600 km. With the modified rates that you are offering we would be saving on the Emergy charge \$5.00 a month, or taking into consideration the total Service Charge and Energy Charge a sum approximately \$100.00 a year. This is too little in my estimation. Father Ricu, principal of the Crowfoot School tells me that at the Lecombe Pome the rates are for lighting Sots a kwand Sots for the motors. This seems to me so much more reasonable. I understand that the Lacombe Home is a charitable institution and I would not wish to be in any way an obstacle to your generosity if such is the case. In one of our Indian Schools in Sask. lerger than that of Clumy the cost of electrical light and power this last year with our own generator was \$130.75. With a 10% depreciation in the value of the plent this cost would be increased by \$173.90. This would give a total cost of slightly over \$300.00 a year. The rates that I am suggesting would bring the cost of light and power to the neighborhood of \$500.00 a year instead of \$780.00. the total and the standard to the absence of Country

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 7th ult., to hand, and in reply we wish to advise that we have given the contents considerable thought.

Our rates are based on a fair return on the invested capital and operating expenses, and for this reason we have a Service Charge and a sliding scale of prices for the energy blocks, so that the customer using a large amount of energy may do so at very little extra cost.

We have, in the past, been billing this service on 10 K.W. and we do not think this is too high, due to the fact that we found it necessary to remove the $7\frac{1}{2}$ K.W. transformer and install a 15 K.W., at the time you erected the new part of the building. As you have a total connected load of approximately 30 K.W. including power and lighting, it appears that 10 K.W. is a very low demand. However, as we have now installed an energy demand meter, the demand will register the total used at any one time, this, of course, may be controlled by yourselves using only the necessary lighting and appliances at a time when the larger ones are used, such as the laundry equipment. This demand meter does not register the total amount used unless that total is on for a period of 10 minutes, therefore, if 10 K.W. were in service for 5 minutes, the demand registered would be approximately 5 K.W., but if this amount were in continuous use for a period of 10 minutes, the full 10 K.W. would be registered on the meter.

This explanation will advise you that our previous service charge based on 10 K.W. is not our of reason, when one considers that at the present time the demand meter registers 8 K.W.

You remark in your letter that the Lacombe Home is billed on a 5¢ and 3¢ rate. This service is taken from the city

of Calgary Distribution System, and is billed by the City. This is hardly a fair comparison with the Cluny School, as it was not necessary for the City to build an expensive extension to serve the Lacombe Home.

You also refer in your letter to the cost of energy in one of your schools in Saskatchewan served by an individual unit. We cannot make any comparison in this regard as we do not know the size of the unit, the demand or energy consumption, or the size of motors used. We know, however, that a 24 hour service cannot be given with an individual unit as economically as our rates.

While the writer visited Father Riou at Clumy a short time ago, we discussed the advisability of installing a power service to separately serve the motors and power equipment, so as to gain advantage of lower energy rates. Father Riou was to inquire into the cost of this and it is quite possible to run a separate circuit for the motors in the laundry, the stoker and pump, which I believe would be an advantage, providing the stokers were operating the year around, but as it is the stoker only being operated a few months in the year, we doubt the advisability of a very large expenditure.

All our discussion has been around perhaps the largest account in the year and after the stoker has been installed for a full year, to compare these accounts with the previous year it may give a different picture.

Dear Sir:

I have received yours of Merch 16th and thank you for same.

I must state very frankly that I am not satisfied. Your conditions are considerably less satisfactory than those we have for the Indian School at St. Paul which is served by the Canadian Utilities of Vegreville. Their Service Charge based on 10 H.P. is \$10.00; first 250 KWH at 7 cts; next 250 KWH at 6 cts; next 500 at 4 cts; excess at 2 cts. Even these conditions I consider slightly high. Unless other conditions are offered in the mean time, I shall ask my Provincial Counsel to approve the necessary expenditure for an installation of our own in July for our three Indian Schools in your jurisdiction.





with regard to your request for the method of procedure to be followed in arranging for a secret ballot, I may say that we have no set method of procedure, each agent conducting such ballots as he sees fit, and according to the wishes of the band. If the voting is by secret ballot, it is necessary, of course, for each Indian to sign his name, or to personally hand his ballot marked to the official in charge, in order that a proper record may be kept of the vote of each Indian as required by the instructions regarding the taking of surrenders.

Referring to our conversation of the 13th inst., regarding the account of the Crowfoot Indian School, Cluny.


You will recall that our discussion centred around the installation of a power service for some of the major appliances, such as the 5 H.P. motor in the laundry, 3 H.P. on the water pump and the 2 H.P. motor on the stoker, and as many other power appliances as can be connected economically.

Some time ago we recommended to Father Riou a separate power service for the major appliances, but to accomplish this it will be necessary to have some changes made in the wiring so as to meter the power separately. Father Riou has, I believe, had some quotations on the cost of making these changes, which in the opinion of the writer should not be very great, especially so when consideration is given to the possible saving that can be made in the monthly accounts.

For the purpose of giving you some idea as to how much saving might be effected by such a change, we have estimated the monthly requirements by using two services and we believe our estimate is conservative.

The attached tabulations will show how we have calculated the accounts, and also a comparison if two services are used, showing a net saving of \$172.37 per annum. The net amounts are shown in each case and the calculation is based on the consumption during the last twelve months.

As you have authorized the writer to interview Father Riou, and have him see that this change is made, I will do so the first time I am in Cluny, which I believe will be about



September 24th.

As soon as the necessary wiring changes are made, we will install Demand Energy Meters on both services and render accounts on the basis of the maximum demand. We believe these demands will not be any higher than the demands we have used in our calculations.

We are sending a copy of this letter to Father Riou for his information, and it will give him an opportunity to make a study of the situation before we pay him a visit.

We trust this will meet with your approval.

Dear Sir,

Mr. G.H. Gooderham, our Indian agent has sent me a copy of your letter dated the I3th of this month concerning the new piggery at the Crowfoot Indian Residential School. Before replying to your letter, I have done what you suggested, namely, inquire from the Principal of the Duck Lake School concerning their piggery, of which you also possess information. Upon receipt of the letter from Father G.M.Lateur, the Principal of the said School, I immediately went to our agent to show him the contehts and to discuss the matter. The discussion was brief, because under our present situation, that is, living in the prairie where there is not a single pole or slab available, what has been done at the Duck Lake School is practically put of the question in our location. This I am sure, the Department is aware of.

The dimension we had given for our new piggery was 66 by 30, and the one in the Duck Lake 80 by 20 and another 76 by 16, and also another of 30 by 20. You can see that these are much larger than the one we ask for. We would be contented with such a type of piggery if the Department would purchase slabs, posts and logs, which Mr. Gooderham told me are not available. Last spring we bought some fence posts, "cedar posts" and as you know, we had to pay 23 cents a piece and "cedar posts" and as you know, we had to pay 23 cents a piece and we had a very hard time getting them. Transportation amounted to 3 cents a linear foot. I inquired about slabs, and I was told that they are not available around here, that we would have to get them from the mountains west of Banff, and that it would cost us much.

So every angle being considered and our present situation taken into consideration it would cost the Department just as much, if not

more to build such a piggery here at the Crowfoot School.

I wish to tell you dear Sir, that if we were in the same kind of country as northern Saskatchewan, where logs, poles and slabs are plentiful, and this I know by experience, because my home town is Ruck Lake, you may be sure that we would do everything we can to show the Department our good will in assisting it, in every way.

You seem to infer in your letter, I quote, From our consideration of the plan suggested by the Principal of the Crowfoot School, we

are under the impression that he contemplates raising hogs on a wholesale scale," I wish to point out regarding this, that first, until now we have been providing ourselves with our own meat; secondly, that we are trying our best to train the older pupils in all branches of farm work; thirdly, that we have also to find means to have a certain cash revenue from the farm, for this reason that the School is being paid for 68 pupils and we have 95 in School. We have 23 children for which we receive no assistancefrom the Department. This cannot be done with the per capita grant we receive. I am, dear Sir,






A REAL PROPERTY AND ADDRESS OF THE PROPERTY ADDRES

In 1913, the Crowfoot Indian Residential School was built one mile from the town of Cluny and on the Blackfoot Reservation. The contract called for a wooden building, planed to accommodate some 60 pupils which the authorities of the School hoped to have in the near future.

This same building is still being used, but instead of 60 pupils, there are now 91 pupils on the School list, 36 of whom are boys and the rest, 55, are girls. Just now 55 girls are crowded in dormitories and halls which were made for 30.

For the last six years, the authorities have asked again and again to have the School enlarged. So far we have been refused, but the yearly increase of pupils, and the certain increase to come in the next seven years, as shown by the acompanying detailed report make it imperative, that the School be enlarged at the earliest possible time.
