Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 31st ultimo, informing the Department of the name of the man whom you have engaged to perform the services of night watchman at the Sacred Heart Indian Residential School.

With reference to accommodation for the night watchman. I have to say that the Department will approve of you incurring an expenditure not exceeding the sum of approximately \$65 in having a partition erected to divide the parlour, in order to provide a room for him. The above amount is to include the cost of material and labour. After the work has been completed to your satisfaction, you should prepare an itemized account, in triplicate, showing the various quantities of material used, the number of days or hours of labour employed and the rate paid. This account, you should hand to Mr. H. C. Lancaster, Indian Agent, who is being informed of the authority granted you to incur the above expenditure. It is hoped that, with the services of the night watchman, any chance of fire hazard will be eliminated.

The Department has noted the need of a frigidaire, but, in this connection, I have to say that it is very doubtful if funds for the purpose can be provided in the Estimates for the next fiscal year.

Dear Father Levern:

I wish to inform you that last winter, in correspondence with our Deputy Minister, I came to the conclusion, from statements he made in some of his letters, that he was anxious to have an exhibit of Indian handicraft and school work at the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede. I had advised him previously that there was nothing of this nature shown at the Stampede: All that represented our Department was a number of painted Indians. When Doctor McGill was here last summer we met Mr. Baker, President, and Mr. Richardson, General Manager of the Exhibition and Stampede, and they informed us that they would be able to give us space, but that during the depression they would not be able to finance any prizes. Doctor McGill then said that he would endeavour to have enough funds supplied to provide for the prizes.

I have been in communication with the Deputy lately, and an item will be placed in the Estimates this year to take care of the Prize List for Indian Exhibits. From this office you received through your Indian Agent a prize list of the Indian Exhibit at Regina Exhibition for this year. I shall be very pleased to hear from you as to whether your school would be prepared to cooperate with us in the event of the Indian Exhibit being introduced. Also, after looking over the Regina Prize List, have you anything to suggest in the way of a change? At the present time, of course, we are not sure of having money voted by Parliament, but I shall let all schools know whether or not this exhibit has been approved. If we go on with it, it will be handled by our own staff, and two or three people will always be in attendance where the work is shown.

I shall be very pleased to hear from all Principals on this matter, and you might address your letter through your Indian Agent.

Dear Sir,

In accordance with the kind decision given on the 30 th of September I927 (Letter No.II6-2-IO) by the Honourable D.C.Scott, I beg to submit you the present application for the admission into our school of Margaret and Frances Thompson, both halfbreed orphans and actually wards of the Provincial Home of Dlinquent and abandoned children, Edmonton. Here are the particulars that I have just received from this Institution:

"By a strange coincidence these two children came under our care on the 21st of August 1934. They happen to be the sisters of Grace Thompson who was sent to you in July 1928. They are very nice children and quite desirable, and physically and mentally O.K. Margaret was born on the 6th of february 1928, and Frances on the 14 th day of August 1925. The mother of the above named children is a half

breed; the father is unknown.

"We are quite willing to send these girls to your school and will also agree to conform to any requirements that you may have pertaining

to their saying on the Reserve."

These two children, therefore, belong to the class of orphans girls which you have kindly authorized me to accept, and consequently I hope that you will approve their admission. You might object that we have our full number: in fact, we have 50 on the roll, but three are at their homes on account of sickness, another one is out also, and there one is to be dicharged very soon, and six others next summer.

on the other hand, I mudt say that the Peigans will be only too glad

to adopt them and to take them into the Band.







Rev. Sir:

The Department is in receipt of Inspector Bremner's report regarding his inspection of the Sacred Heart Indian Residential School on November 14th, last. Mr. Bremner reports very favourably on the work that is being done and states he considers that the pupils are making excellent progress.

With special reference to teaching methods, the Inspector writes as follows:

"Both teachers are very keen and have up-to-date training through summer school. This training is being applied effectively, so there is little to suggest here in the way of method. I have found too that they apply intelligently suggestions given by me.

Mechanical Arithmetic needs to be more rapid, but it is very accurate even now. Possibly a little more chance for originality in Composition would be good for them."

L'Ecole fonctionne tres bien, tout semble y etre prospere, et je crois que le Departement a lieu d'etre content du travail du personnel et du beau resultat qui couronne leurs efforts. Il y a cependant un point tres grave sur lequel je desire attirer votre attention : c'est celui de l'approvisionnement d'eau. On souffre ici beaucoup du manque d'eau, tant pour le premières necessites de l'Ecole elle-meme que pour les besoins de l'etable. Faute d'eau, il a ete impossible de donner aux enfants leur bain hebdomadaire et cela depuis le mois de septembre; faute d'eau, les egouts se bouchent continuellement, et parfois on ne peut se servir des cabinets. Pourtant, je pruis vous en donner la certitude, tout le monde s'ingenie a menager l'eau le plus possible. C'est a peine s'il y en a assez, a certains jours, pour la cuisine et pour empecher les animaux de souffrir de la soif. Ne pensez-vous pas qu'il y a la un etat de choses qui ne doit pas se prolonger davantage ? Les risques que l'on court sont grands, et malgre toutes les precautions prises par le personnel, un rien, dans des conditions semblables, pourrait causer des malheurs irreparables. Je me permets donc d'insister aupres de vous et aupre du Surintendant General, M.le Dr. McGill, pour qu'un remede effica ce soit apporte immediatement a cette situation.
