Extracts from Bishop Legal's Notes

Bellevue - Mining town in Crow's Nest Pass. Population - 60. No church; no resident priest; attended from Coleman.

Church Property: an irregular piece of land, on N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ sect. 20. West of 5th merid. Donation for church purposes by West Canadian Collieries Co. The Certif. of Title. R.R. 216 - has been remitted to the Company for the delivery of another transfer. This declaration will be forwarded later on.

Coleman - In Crow's Nest Pass. Mining town - Population 600. One church, Holy Ghost, one resident priest; Rev. Father Dellestre, O.Praem.

Blairmore - Mining town in Crow's Nest Pass - Population 80. One temporary church, no resident priest, attended from Coleman.

Cowley - C.P.R. line, west of Macleod. Population 40. No church; no resident priest; attended from Pincher Creek. No church property.

Burmis - On Crow's Nest line, West of Macleod. Population 50. No church; no resident priest, attended from Pincher Creek. No church property.

Passburg - In the Crow's Nest Pass. Mining town. Population 90. No church; no resident priest; attended from Frank or Coleman.

Frank - In the Crow's Nest Pass. Mining town. Population 200. One church, - "Corpus Christi"! No resident priest for the present; attended from Coleman.

There was a resident priest here for a long time. He has quit, and there has been no possibility of putting another in charge. The last priest, Rev. Father Sammut has taken little interest in the work, and since the departure of a former priest: Rev. Father F. Lajat, o.s.b., little has been done to improve the situation.

This is the place where, some years ago, took place the terrific Rock slide, which carried with it half of the town. The place has never fully recovered from the effect of the disaster.


The church property is a donation from the "American Coal & Coke Co." This property and the church itself are said to be in the danger zone. It would be a pity to remove the church which is a pretty good one and located in a magnificent position. To my mind it is outside of the danger zone, created by Turtle mountain.

Hillcrest - In Crow's Nest Pass. Mining town. Population 80. No church; no resident priest; attended from Coleman. No church property.

Fr. Beaton & the founding of Ballanora Parish

On instructions from Archbishop MacNeil of Toronto I came to Calgary on the 17th April 1914. His Grace had told me Calgary Diocese was very short of priests. With the exception of three days I was away in Edmonton visiting friends I remained in Calgary until the 4th of May 1914. At the beginning I applied for the ordinary faculties of the Diocese and was granted them. Nothing particular however was given me to do but that gave me more opportunity to explore a great part of the city especially the part around Bridge and where the Italians, Ruthenians and other foreigners were congregated. Another priest made the mistake of getting acquainted with the prominent and well-to-do Catholics for which he incurred the ire of ^{the} rector of the Cathedral at the time and also of some of his lieutenants.

On Sunday evening May 3rd after supper at St Mary's we were sitting in the hall up stairs - a place then used as a smoking room, when Bishop McHale came and sat with us. For a while he spoke of conditions in the Crows Nest Pass - of the great amount of work to be done there and then turning to me said "Father Beaton I am going to send you down to the Crows Nest Pass." I answered "all right my Lord." Then the Bishop called his secretary Father Hetherington and asked him to send a telegram to Father Delestre of Coleman that next day Father Beaton would go down there to help him prepare the children for Confirmation and to meet him at the station. Directly the Bishop did not give me any definite work, I heard his hands dictating the telegram to Father Delestre that James to help him (Delestre) prepare the children for Confirmation. No other work was mentioned. It surprised me not a little. I had been led to believe that the Diocese of Calgary was short of priests and here the only work being given me was a work often relegated to laymen and as often as not to women and even that was given me only indirectly. In the three years I was in Calgary Diocese I never got any other appointment or remuneration from the Bishop or from anyone else in authority. Seventeen months after my arrival



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hurried to get an urgent dispensation I met his Lordship on a train coming from Portland and he gave me all the faculties that he had himself. He gave the same to other priests who were stationed in out-of-the-way and difficult places. Anyway having some kind of an order from the Bishop of Calgary even if indirect I got ready and next morning May 4th 1914 left for Coleman arriving there that evening. On my arrival Father Delaché showed me the telegram he had received from the Bishop the contents of which I had heard the evening before.

Next day we visited Blairmore and Frank. Father Delaché having his hands full at Coleman generously gave me the rest of the Pass to the East - that is Blairmore, Frank, Hillcrest, Bellevue, Parleying, Burns, North Dork and South Dork. At once I established myself at Frank's boarding at the Sanatorium Hotel and from that cutler worked until the early fall. Following the Bishop's indirect instructions I paid special attention to the children attending to the other work more as a side line. During the summer while on a visit to Calgary the Bishop's housekeeper of her own accord told me I was stationed in the Pass permanently - that I was just the priest for the place - fitting in well with the rough miners! I took this as a kind of left hand compliment but did not say a word. It became clear to me then however that more than helping Father Delaché to prepare the children of the Pass for Confirmation was expected of me in Calgary and so I went ahead.

In the early part of the fall I moved to Bellevue boarding at the Bellevue Hotel. Having studied the situation up and down the Pass I was now ready to begin a program. I got permission from the Bishop to build a church in Bellevue. Of his own accord he promised to give One thousand dollars towards its construction. Times were bad in the coal mines of the Pass and the Slovaks, Hungarians and Poles on whom I had to rely for the most part of the contributions were not getting much work. They and

a few men like Jim Coddle and the Boyle brothers dug out the basement and built the concrete walls under the church, Oct 2nd 1914 was the day on which we began the actual work on the site. It may not be amiss to mention an incident in connection with the work on the foundation. A Slovak butcher in Bellevue had supplied four or five Russians who were out of work with meat and provisions for several months. They could not pay and if once they left town the butcher said he never would get his own. So he asked me if I would take four or five men he was going to send to work on the church basement on condition that I supply each with three meals a day while working. So this I agreed. The butcher then made arrangements with the Russians to work at the foundation of our church at 30¢ a day and board until their bill at his shop was paid. They were glad to get the chance. I arranged with a Chinese restaurant to give the Russians three meals a day at \$1.05. The first morning they showed away so much provisions that the Cleanaman was having visions of being broke by the end of the week! With the meals they demanded cigarettes and at the works they demanded beer! Any way they worked until their bill at the butchers was paid up and they were let go. In a day or two quietly they tried to get their wages from Mr. Hughes the head Carpenter. He saw at once that if he gave them the money they would in all probability skip out of town and not pay the butcher. Mr. Hughes referred them to me. I explained the situation to the Russians and showed them a receipt in full for what they owed the butcher. I had offered the butcher the money but he would not take it. He gave it all - about ~~sixty~~ dollars or so as a gift to the new church and gave me a receipt in full for his charges against the aforesaid Russians. As the butcher was a Slovak Austrian - and the Great War was on, the Russians thought they would make trouble for him as they all went to the Mounted Police ~~Detachment~~ and put them complaint before the Sergeant. The butcher was called for an explanation

and he quiet. The Sergeant opened the door and told the Russians to get out quick and keep going! That was the last we heard of them.

On Dec 31st 1914 the tower and the cross were raised. Towards the end of the first week in January 1915 Bishop McTally made inquiries if another priest could get work in the Pass saying that he had met an Italian priest at the Delegation in Okotoks for whom he would like to find work. I answered at once that there was work enough in the Pass for three or four more priests - good missionaries but not for anyone else at the same time suggesting that the Italian priest be tried out in Calgary looking after the Italians there under the supervision of some of the other priests in the City. I mentioned also that in the case of a good missionary the great question would be proper support. For answer - a telegram that the Italian priest was coming on the next train and for me to meet him. I did. This was on Jan 15th 1915. My income then in the Pass was not enough to meet the absolutely necessary expenses and here I had another priest on my hands! It happened at the time that Father John of Coleman was away in a hospital and not expected to return for several months. The Italian priest then went to Coleman to look after that town.

On May 1st 1915 the first Mass was celebrated in the new Church Bellevue but a private Mass only. About this time Prohibition having come into force in Alberta the Bellevue Hotel closed its doors. Fortunately I had provided two rooms over the Society in the new church and I moved in there. The teachers in the public school could not get boarding places so most of them clustered together and rented a house. The principal Mr. Kelly was able to get a small room. The two girls took our meals at one of the Chinese restaurants. At the end of a week having with the aid of Mr. Kelly found out some of the secrets of the Chinese kitchen I could not bring myself to go to that restaurant any more. There was only one of two ways out of it - to rent a house and get a housekeeper or to do my own housekeeping. The income I was getting would not allow me to rent a house, furnish it ^{with everything necessary} and pay a housekeeper and at the same

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time meet my own bills and get something towards the new church. Rather than go into debt, I decided to do my own housekeeping ^{in the rooms at the rear of the church}. Needless to say I got on well - at least to my own satisfaction. On Sunday May 9th 1915 the first public mass was celebrated in the new St Cyril's church Bellerue. It was crowded to the doors.

The church was dedicated to St Cyril in this way. I had asked the Bishop to give it a name but he left the selection to myself. A number of names were passed in review until I thought of another church far away situated just like the Bellerue church overlooking a river, in a valley surrounded by high mountains in a spot that through ages of persecution had kept the faith and handed it down untautened - to me among the rest - and out of gratitude for this precious gift of faith the name of St Cyril's church in the Bronx of Rochester Scotland was given to the new church in Bellerue. St Cyril who was a name ^{well known} among the Slavs who formed most of the congregation.

During the three years I was in the Pass work was as a rule slack in the mine especially for members of our congregation. Besides building the church it was necessary also to get something towards my own support. Quite a lot of money was used in spreading Catholic literature among the people, in looking after orphans and in other urgent causes. I worked without a salary. Those who came to church were very good to me giving very generously out of their limited means. The Slovaks, Hungarians, Poles and Irish Catholics were as a rule very good. The Italians, Belgians and French ^{and Bohemians}, with few exceptions acted as they do everywhere else. During the winter and bad weather I practically finished the inside of the church myself. At the end so as to leave the new church to my successor without any debt I paid all the bills against it out of my own funds. This amount together with other various sums of a parochial nature ^{which} out of my own pocket since coming into the Pass amounted

to about \$1145⁰⁰ in all - a sum which the Church Extension Society really should have paid as the people who came to church contributed fully according to their means. A good Catholic people who have to struggle to provide for their own spiritual needs should not have an added burden imposed upon them for the sake of Careless Catholics who have a lot of money for worldly purposes but not one cent - generally speaking - towards the expense of the church in their midst. Rich Catholic Commanders should be made to contribute to such missionary purposes and the carrying out of that program is the work of the Catholic Church Extension Society of Canada.

During my time in the Pass on account of conditions in Calgary itself a number of priests had to take the trail for other fields of labor. The day came when for much the same reasons I too had to go by the via pacis. I was sorry to leave the people who had been so good to me during the few years I was there.

As to the beginnings of the Church in that part of the Pass you will be able to gather some information from the old timers. Catholic missionaries followed the marie Indians up through the Pass on their way to the buffalo hunts in the Kootenay country. The Oblate Fathers followed the construction gangs where that branch of the C.P.R. was being built. Among the men were many Irish and Scotch Catholics from Ontario, the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. An old Oblate told me these men were very good Catholics and very generous contributors to the support of the priests. After the railroad went through the mines opened up and many miners came out from Belgium and Northern France. The Oblates found ~~here~~ these their own countrymen very indifferent towards the practice of the faith and towards the support of the priest and the church. They then left the Pass to casual priests. One or two of their own were stationed there for a short term but for disciplinary purposes.

Among those who labored there was Father Loyer O.F.M. He lived in Frank over

the P. Burns meat store. The following incident will give you an idea of what he had to deal with: He found in Frank a whole lot of Bohemian couples living together without being married. He made one big day of it and got them all to the church to marry them. A share of the population was there for witness. Before marrying them he made them all go to confession. Father Layat's great difficulty was that two and sometimes three Bohemians would enter the same box in the confessional at the same time! He had to come out of his place and pull the extra ones out of the confessional so that they could make their confessions one at a time! From this one can infer how much - or rather how little the Bohemians - a supposedly Catholic people knew about their religion.

On another occasion Father Layat was passing through Bellevue on his way to say Mass somewhere. He had an old horse and buggy. The vestments that were in a box behind began to drop out here and there on the road. A miner seeing what was happening stopped him saying "Mr. Priest! See! You are losing your tools!"

Besides Father Layat there were several other priests ~~and other priests~~ working in that part of the Pass for short periods. Among them was one who took up his residence in Bellevue. He selected a place for a church there and collected some money towards its construction. Some of the miners made charges against him which were aired in Court. He left and after that the whole of the Pass was allowed to by Father Delestre of Coleman until I came and relieved him of the task end of it.

I have not yet answered Mr. Donovan's letter. He certainly is a good man. It would not do for me however to invite him to come West to see the country or to look for a job under present conditions.





Right Rev and Dear Sir -

Next week Father Meissner of Fernie is coming down and we are going to visit North Fork and surrounding districts. In one spot there are over a dozen Slav families and nine or ten French speaking ones. Beyond that up the Gap - 60 miles north of the Pass - are settlers scattered here and there all the way - many of them being Catholic. As far as I can find out no priest has ever said mass - or attended to Catholics out in that direction. I saw a number of the Slavs in Passburg and Burns where they have friends and do their shopping. On the way out North Fork there is a small settlement of Italian ranchers - about 30 souls - and no one has ever been to see them. I am writing you this note to get faculties for Dr. Meissner and shall take it for granted that he has faculties unless you, Lordship writes otherwise. It is an old standing order on the border line between the two dioceses here that the priests of the one diocese have faculties also in the other.

Pt. Rev. and Dear Sir-

I am enclosing an inventory of everything left in the Bellevue Church. The Carpenter did not finish the job of putting storm doors and shutters on the building before I left and I wrote him twice to find out but had no reply. I delayed sending the inventory and the financial statement in the hope of getting word from the Carpenter and clearing out the whole business but it seems I must send you the list incomplete or uncertain at least as far as the above particular item is concerned. As my net income in the Pass over and above the necessary personal expenses would not pay for a quarter of the amount spent on the building and equipment in Bellevue, I had outside your own governs help - & pay the rest out of my own pocket. A financial statement covering everything from the beginning will be sent you as soon as the matter above mentioned is closed out.

Rt. Rev. & dear Bishop:

I paid a visit to Father Cosman
and discussed matters pertaining
to the Pass.

Naturally he is somewhat disengaged
at the outlook of things.

As you know, the Pass is the most diffi-
cile section of the entire process.

As Father Cosman's territory now
stands, it is far from such a thing
as a parish ^{and} having lived here
the Pass for sometime, I can sympathize
with him in his present difficulty,
fully realizing as I do that someone
must do the work.

Out of loyalty to you and in the interest
of the diocese, permit me to suggest
the following plan.

- 1 Blairmore is an equal distance from
Belliveau as it is from Coleraine.
- 2 Transfer the care of Blairmore to
Father Coombe.
- 3 Owing to the location and condition
of the Grand Church, it is a serious
risk for priest and parishioners to
hold mass there.
- 4 Messrs J. Gillis of Blairmore and
Chas Tompkins of Grant suggest
that you give the permission to
tear down the Grand Church and
move it further west toward
Blairmore, to a location convenient
to the Catholics of Blairmore and Grant,
the Government giving a grant of
\$800.00 for so removing the church.
As far as my support is concerned,
it will mean a financial sacrifice
to relinquish the care of Blairmore.

3. I am willing to make the sacrifice,
in the interest of the diocese, as
I know that under present conditions
it will be difficult, if not impossible,
for a priest to make both ends meet.
Father Bealov managed to do it, but
there are very few priests willing to
live the manner of life that he did.
Please do not misunderstand the
letter, my dear Bishop, as it is written
with the very best of motives.
Owing to the long duration of the
strike, money is very scarce here
in the Pass, and I know that St. Casimir
will not get very much during these
troublesome times. So if you think
my plan of transferring Blarney
to him is good one, & think it
would be advisable to notify
him at once. Another point in favor
of the change is the fact that the Colman
people are clamoring for two months ^{on Sunday}
as we cannot accommodate the crowd at one mass.

I regret very much that I cannot
at the present send anything
towards the Peter's Pence Collection,
owing to the strike, but
have hopes of doing something
when the men resume work.

Mass intentions are few and
far between just now and
I would appreciate it very
much if you could send me
a few.

Dear Fr. Dargan,

The Bishop has just gone away for two weeks; and you therefore can hardly have a reply to your proposal till the end of the month, or possibly the Bishop might postpone his decision until he can discuss it with you on the spot when he is in the Pass for Visitation.

But I should think that before he gives his consent, he would wish to know just how and where the new site, convenient to Frank and Blairmore, was likely to be found. I believe that the Mine Company has before now offered a new site for a church at Blairmore; but would it fit in with your plan?

Further, the question of moving the old church from the mountain peak in Frank was considered by Frs. Belalstre, and Beaton and the Maltese Father; but they abandoned the idea. Apparently, they could not get the grant when they got down to business. It would be well to find out particulars of the possibility and the cost of moving the Frank church, and of the conditions for obtaining the government grant, while awaiting the Bishop's return.

My Lord:-

When I left Calgary, If I remember correctly, you told me that some "Guild" in Toronto would be glad to assist one of these missions. May I ask Your Lordship when I may get in touch with to procure such aid, and also what is the nature of the aid which they offer. I am in need of many things for the church, and unless the people respond more freely financially than they have this last month I will be unable to live here much less to procure the necessary articles to build up the church. However I have one thing in my favor this month which is the mines will reopen to-morrow; but just what the future will bring forth remains to be seen: yet I live in hope of "Pulling through O.K." As you know, I presume, the men have been out on "strike" for three months, consequently loose money, just now around here, is very scarce. I reached here at a very unop~~r~~tunate time, financially; yet spiritually at a very opportune moment, as I had a good opportunity to meet and "Round Up" all the men.

I am pleased to report, My Lord, that I have no reason to complain as to the spiritual sucess that I have had since I arrived here--thanks to the Dear Sacred Heart. My congregation on the first Sunday was not very large; but the following Sundays the church has been well filled, and in fact even the third Sunday, which was a very wet and dirty day there was not an available seat in the church, and many had to stand.

As soon as I arrived I made a house to house canvas of the parish, and found out the exact spiritual condition of every individual and as a result I rounded up three who had not bee to conf. for over 20yrs: II over 15yrs: some 25 over 10yrs: and many over 5yrs, in fact I found very few who had been to conf. or made their Easter Duty last year.

During the month of the Sacred Heart I had instructions with prayers and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament every Sun. Wed. & Fri. evening for the spiritual groth of the parish, and I had wonderful results. It was almost like a mission there was not a morning that I did not have two or three conf., and many mornings I had as many as 40 to mass. the people--even the Non Catholics-- wonder what cause such a number to turn out. So as I said--Thanks to the Dear Sacred Heart of Our Divine Lord-- I have no reason to complai There are only 2or 3 when I put down as Catholics, who have not been to the sacraments. I expect fully 90% of the parish to receive on next First Friday.

I found no place here fit to stay in when I arrived, and so it has given me an enormous amount of work during the past month for, in addition to the spiritual care of the parish, I had to fix up a room fit to stay in, and to make matters worse there is not a fit place in the town where I can eat at





As you have already given
the permission off for painting
the church, we will start it this
week. We will have to put a
toilet and wash basin in the living
quarters here.

Mr Hamey, the bank mgr. told
me that there are about 800 men
engaged in the Bellevue and the
Hillcrest mine. About 750 of them are
or should be catholics, Roman Catholics.
About 14 of the 750 attend Holy Mass.

There are over 700 children
practically all roman catholic children
in the 3 strictly protestant schools
here. 31 of the 700 attend catechism.

Mr Lamey says that for the last 2 weeks in July pay cheques for these miners were cashed to the extent of \$78,000. Two weeks pay.

Still \$9.50 for the Faith collection and \$7.60 for the Sunday collection here.

On Sunday I have low mass at 8:30 and High Mass at 10:30
catechism at 2 p.m.
Benediction at 7:30 with evening
prayers and an instruction before it.

Mass every morning also at 8 sharp.

About 60 people attend Sunday Masses and half that number come to Benediction. There are hundreds of Italians here not one of their swarthy faces is ever seen in their church. Poles, Slovaks, Assyrians, Hungarians, Lithuanians-Hungarians, all kinds of people come but no Italians—


