I beg to inform you that I made a recent visit to the R. C. School on the Peigan Reserve, and I find that the water supply situation is really serious. I feel that the Department should without delay take this matter into its serious consideration, as, if a fire should occur and the present situation exists, there would be a great danger of losing the plant and perhaps a great loss of life; for, as you know, the school is of frame construction, four stores high, and a fire once started would do a great deal of damage. I have before me your letter of the 2nd of August, No. 116-2-5, and I am making this request in the face of the fact that it is stated that there are no funds available for this purpose.

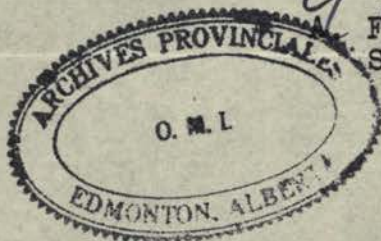

Dear Sir,

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your kind letter of the 23d inst., No 116-2-5, dated, and to repeat again in reply that the poor condition of our water supply is causing me a great and continual worry.

We have 5 Foamite and 8 Fire Gun Extinguishers and 4 axes, placed in the different stories of the house, and 2 fire escapes. The fire escapes are situated at each end of the building, with doors opening on them in the upper stories. The pupils are given a fire drill at least once a month during the night, and the large pupils are taught to take care of the little ones; when the alarm is rung, each large pupil runs towards the bed of the little one intrusted to his care. Every night, after every body is gone to bed, I go around with my flash light and assure myself that every thing is O.K.

On the other hand, I believe that it would be a good idea indeed to have a night watchman from now on till the spring: we have a man, right here, who would be glad to do this if he is given a decent salary.

By the way, let me respectfully ask the Department this question: Why do you build on the Indian Reserves such narrow and high schools? We are not in the cities, where the lots cost so much; we have as much room as can be desired, and it costs nothing.

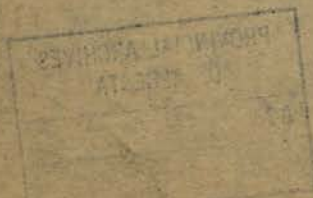

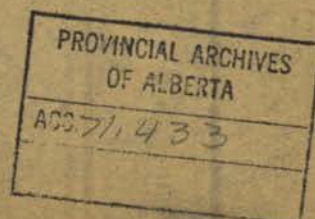

This little girl does not belong to the Peigan Reserve : Her father (Stephen McGarty) is a Treaty Indian, a Cree, belonging to the Onion Lake Band, an ex-pupil of Dunbow St Joseph Industrial School, and now a prisoner in Prince-Albert ! Her mother (Christine Greenwood) is a non-treaty Cree half-breed, and an ex-pupil of Crowfoot School, Cluny.

Stephen and Christine, although lawfully married in the church, went apart three years ago, and have never met since then; Stephen is in Prince-Albert Penitentiary, as I have just said, and Christine has been going from one town to another with her child, - and you know what that means. She is now in Pincher-Creek, and the ex-mayor of that town (Mr Bossenberry, now a member of the Parliament of Alberta) has besought me to take her child in our school. So, Christine brought her in, yesterday, and she is willing to leave her here, and later on, on the reserve.

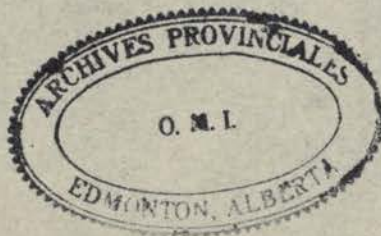
